

School News: Maths Department:

<u>Welsh Department:</u> Urdd Gobaith Cymru – Urdd the Hope of Wales

Urdd, the Welsh youth organisation celebrates it's 100th birthday this year on January the 25th. Let's take a look at how the organisation started, and what it provides for the children and young people of Wales.



Urdd Gobaith Cymru was established by Sir Ifan ab Owen Edwards in 1922. His aim was to protect the Welsh language in a world where the English language dominated every aspect of life outside the home.

In an issue of the magazine 'Cymru'r Plant' in 1922 Syr Ifan said, 'These days, in many villages, and in most towns in Wales, children play and read in English. They forget that they are Welsh.'

At the beginning of the twentieth century, the future looked bleak for the Welsh language, even though there were over a million Welsh speakers in Wales. Two of the most prominent figures to challenge the crisis at this time were O.M. Edwards and his son, Sir Ifan ab Owen Edwards. O.M. Edwards, Wales' first Chief Inspector for Education, contributed on a regular basis to the monthly magazine 'Cymru'r Plant', established by him in 1892. He published many Welsh books on Wales and Welsh politics. In his articles he encouraged awareness amongst the Welsh people of Welsh culture and traditions. He tried twice to establish a youth movement for the young people and children of Wales. 'Urdd y Delyn' was established in 1896, and 'Byddin Cymru' in 1911, but both attempts failed. O. M. Edwards died in 1920, but his life and ideas were an inspiration to his son to develop a new successful movement.

After the death of O.M.Edwrads, his son Sir Ifan ab Owen Edwards became the editor for the magazine 'Cymru'r Plant' and in 1922, in that magazine, he appealed to the children of Wales to join a new movement which was called 'Urdd Gobaith Cymru Fach'. This was a new beginning in the history of the Welsh language and culture. The reaction was positive from the start and he received many letters and ideas. The enthusiasm amongst the readers of 'Cymru'r Plant' overwhelmed Hughes and Son press in Wrexham. By the end of the year, names of 720 new members had appeared in the magazine and hundreds more were eagerly awaiting their turn. The first local Urdd branch was established in Treuddyn, Flintshire in 1922.

A lot has changed since the early days! Today, the Urdd is the largest organisation for children and young people in Wales. The Urdd has over 53,000 members under 25 years old every year. 30% of all Welsh speakers in Wales aged between 8-25 are Urdd members. Today the Urdd has 305 staff members, 10,000 volunteers, 900 branches and 200 branches in the community.

The Urdd organisation celebrates Welsh history, it's language and its heritage. It is responsible for organising and holding the annual National Eisteddfod, but does so much more for the youth of Wales. This includes:

- Residential centres 'Llangrannog' and 'Glan-llyn' where young people can stay and use the Welsh language for day-to-day activities.
- Sport and craft clubs held after school through the medium of Welsh.
- Publish many Welsh magazines, aimed at a variety of ages.

- Offer apprenticeships across a range of sectors in Wales.
- Hold free Welsh medium play schemes in school holidays.

Diwrnod Santes Dwynwen is considered to be the Welsh equivalent to Valentine's Day and is celebrated on 25th of January every year. It celebrates Dwynwen, the Welsh saint of lovers.

In the 5th century, Dwynwen fell in love with a man named Maelon Dafodrill. Maelon returned Dwynwen's feelings but they could not be together, for Dwynwen's father forbade the marriage and her father had already promised her to someone else. Distraught by her love for Maelon, Dwynwen prays she would fall out of love with him.

After falling asleep, or possibly while still awake in the woods she had run to in her distress, Dwynwen was visited by an angel, who appeared carrying a sweet potion designed to erase all memory of Maelon and turn him into a block of ice. God then gave three wishes to Dwynwen. First, she wished that Maelon be thawed, second that God met the hopes and dreams of true lovers and third that she should never marry ever. All three were fulfilled, and as a mark of her thanks, Dwynwen devoted herself to God's service for the rest of her life.

Dwynwen became a nun, fulfilling her wish to never marry. She left for the island of Anglesey and built a Church, which became known as Llanddwyn, literally meaning "Church of Dwynwen". Its remains can still be seen today on the island of Llanddwyn, off the coast of Anglesey. The smaller island also contains Dwynwen's well, where, allegedly, a sacred fish swims, whose movements predict the future fortunes and relationships of various couples. Another tradition claims that if the water boils while visitors are present, then love and good luck will surely follow.

The popularity and celebration of St Dwynwen's day has increased considerably in recent years, with special events, such as concerts and parties, often held and greetings cards printed. Although still not as popular as St Valentine's Day in February, St Dwynwen is certainly becoming better-known among today's population of Wales. **#WillowsWelsh**

Health and Well-being:

Here is a recipe for a traditional Nigerian dish that your family may enjoy:

Classic Nigerian Jollof Rice



Jollof Rice is much loved South of the Sahara and along the coast of West Africa.

Ingredients:

- ¹/₃ cup oil (vegetable/canola/coconut, not olive oil)
- 6 medium-sized fresh plum/Roma tomatoes, chopped, OR a 400-gram tin of tomatoes
- 6 fresh, red poblano peppers (or 4 large red bell peppers), seeds discarded
- 3 medium-sized red onions (1 sliced thinly, 2 roughly chopped), divided
- ¹/₂ to 1 hot pepper, or to taste (yellow Scotch bonnets are my favourite)
- 3 tablespoons tomato paste
- 2 teaspoons (Caribbean/Jamaican-style) curry powder
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- 2 dried bay leaves
- 5 to 6 cups stock (vegetable, chicken, or beef) or water, divided
- 2 teaspoons unsalted butter (optional), divided
- 4 cups uncooked converted long-grain rice or golden sella basmati, rinsed
- Salt, to taste
- Black and white pepper, to taste
- Extra: sliced onions, tomatoes
- In a blender, combine tomatoes, red poblano (or bell) peppers, chopped onions and Scotch bonnets with 2 cups of stock, blend until smooth (about a minute or two). You should have roughly 6 cups of blended mix. Pour into a large pot / pan and bring to the boil then turn down the heat and let simmer, covered for 10 – 12 minutes.
- 2. In a large pan, heat oil and add the sliced onions. Season with a pinch of salt, stir-fry for 2 to 3 minutes, then add the bay leaves, curry powder and dried thyme and a pinch of black pepper for 3 4 minutes on medium heat. Then add the tomato paste stir for another 2 minutes. Add the reduced tomato-pepper-Scotch bonnet mixture, stir, and set on medium heat for 10 to 12 minutes till reduced by half, with the lid on. This is the stew that will define the pot.

- 3. Add 4 cups of the stock to the cooked tomato sauce and bring it to boil for 1 2 minutes.
- 4. Add the rinsed rice and butter, stir, cover with a double piece of foil/baking or parchment paper and put a lid on the pan—this will seal in the steam and lock in the flavour. Turn down the heat and cook on low for 30 minutes.
- 5. Stir rice—taste and adjust as required.
- 6. If you like, add sliced onions, fresh tomatoes and the 2nd teaspoon of butter and stir through.


Cardiff Youth Service:
