

PE Department:

Set for Success Empowerment Day

On Friday 21st January 2022 the Set for Success group attended a virtual 'Empowerment Day' led by the Youth Sport Trust and Wimbledon Foundation. The group has opportunities to listen to the keynote speaker Michelle Westwood, a serving Naval Officer and Trustee of the Royal Navy and Royal Marines Charity who shared her personal journey into employment. She explained the core values of the Royal Navy which also reflects the Willows Character and Culture we are developing such as commitment, courage, discipline, respect for others, integrity and loyalty.

The group also had an interactive session with three employers, an estate agent, a live sports camera operator and an owner of a sports media company. Learners were encouraged to ask questions linked to their journey into the world of work and how they came to do their current job. The pupils from Willows were highly engaged and respectful of the employer's honest answers to their questions.

Finally, the group had to present their Powerpoint Presentation based on their social action project which was to raise awareness and funds for Llamau, a local youth homelessness charity. They were also asked to evaluate the skills that they have learnt during the course and how it is linked to employability.

Tom Haffield our Athlete Mentor was present for the day and was proud of the group' achievements and commitment over the past 18 months. Next month (February 2022) the second cohort will enrol onto the Leadership Course and the current Set For Success group will act as mentors and will be able to demonstrate their leadership skills by supporting the new cohort.

Art Department:

Art Silk-Screen Printmaking workshop:

The Year 11 Art pupils had the fantastic opportunity to work with inspirational artists from The Printhaus in Cardiff, producing stunning silk-screen prints based on the theme 'Surrealism'. The pupils started to create simple line drawings from music which they then converted into stencils using coloured acetate, which then became Surreal silk-screen prints.







<u>Welsh Department:</u> Love Spoons – Llwyau Caru

A Love spoon is a wooden spoon, decoratively carved, that was traditionally presented as a gift of romantic intent. The spoon is normally decorated with symbols of love and was intended to reflect the skill of the carver. Due to the intricate designs, love spoons are no longer used as functioning spoons and are now decorative craft items.



The love spoon is a traditional craft that dates to the seventeenth

century. Over generations, decorative carvings were added to the spoon and it lost its original practical use and became a treasured decorative item to be hung on a wall. The earliest known dated love spoon from Wales, displayed in the St Fagans National History Museum in Cardiff, is from 1667, although the tradition is believed to date back long before that. The earliest dated love spoon worldwide originates from Germany and is dated as 1664.

The love spoon was given to a young woman by her suitor. It was important for the girl's father to see that the young man can provide for the family and can craft with wood.

Sailors would often carve love spoons during their long journeys, which is why anchors would often be incorporated into the carvings. Certain symbols came to have specific meanings: a horseshoe for luck, a cross for faith, bells for marriage, hearts for love, a wheel supporting a loved one and a lock for security, among others. Caged balls indicated the number of children hoped for. Other difficult carvings, such as chains, were as much a demonstration of the carver's skill as a symbolic meaning.

Although the Welsh love spoon is the most famous, there are also traditions of love spoons in Scandinavia and some parts of Eastern Europe, which have their own unique styles and techniques when it comes to the love spoon.

Today love spoons are given as wedding and anniversary gifts, as well as birthday, baby gifts, Christmas or Valentine's Day gifts. They are now mostly seen as a folk craft.

In old times, newly married couples in Norway ate with linked spoons to symbolize the linkage of their marriage. Often the spoons and chain were made from a single piece of wood, emphasizing wood-carving craftsmanship.

Traditionally crafted love spoons are available to buy from the Welsh shop in town, opposite Cardiff Castle.



<u>Rights Respecting Schools – Article of the Week</u>



Holocaust Memorial Day takes place on 27th January every year.

27th January marks the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau, the largest Nazi death camp. On this day, we remember the six million Jewish people who were killed during the Holocaust, alongside millions of other people who were killed under Nazi persecution and in genocides that followed in Cambodia, Rwanda, Bosnia and Darfur. Holocaust Memorial Day is for everyone. Each year, across the UK, thousands of people come together to learn more about the past and take action to create a safer future. The theme for 2022 is One Day – that in the future there may be one day with no genocide. Holocaust Memorial Day is promoted and supported by the Holocaust Memorial Day Trust.

Article 37 - No child should be tortured, sentenced to death, imprisoned unfairly or treated in a cruel or inhuman way
Article 38 - No child under 15 should join the army and children should be protected in war





Health and Well-being:

We would like to wish all of our Chinese families a very Happy New Year! In Mandarin, the most common way to wish your family and close friends a happy Chinese New Year is "Xīnnián hǎo" (新年好), literally meaning 'New Year Goodness' or 'Good New Year'. Another way to say "Happy Chinese New Year" is "Xīnnián kuàilè" (新年快乐), literally meaning 'New Year happiness'. It is a formal greeting typically used for strangers.

This year is the Year of the Tiger. The Tiger is known as the king of all beasts in China. The zodiac sign Tiger is a symbol of **strength**, **exorcising evils**, and **braveness**. Many Chinese children wear hats or shoes with a tiger image of for good luck.




Cardiff Youth Service:
